Lydgate-Kapaa Bike/Pedestrian Path

The County of Kaua'i, Department of Public Works proposes to construct a 10-12 foot wide shared use path, approximately two miles long, from Lydgate Park to Waika'e Canal. The proposed path will be one segment of a longer, continuous pathway from Nāwiliwili to Anahola. The scope of this project also includes two feeders connecting Wailua House Lots and Kawaihau.

The south end of the alignment is a stubout near Aloha Beach Resort where the existing path at Lydgate Park terminates. The new path will cross the Wailua River via a cantilevered attachment on the existing cane haul bridge. The river crossing portion of the path will be constructed as part of a separate State Department of Transportation project to improve the cane haul bridge.

Going north, the path will pass through Wailua Beach Park, then turn onto Papaloa Road. The main path will turn mauka at Lanikai Street, with a spur on Papaloa continuing to the Coconut Marketplace. The path will cross Kuhio Highway, then resume a northerly course, crossing the temporary bypass and alongside Waipouli Canal to Uhelekawawa Canal. The path will cross Uhelekawawa Canal using a new bridge between two shopping centers. Crossing Kuhio Highway at the signalized intersection, the alignment will shift to the makai side of the highway. It will turn onto Ala Road, go along Niulani Street, then Moanakai Road to Waika'e Canal.

There will be a spur through the Waipouli resort area beginning at a vacant property north of Kauai Coast Resort, continuing north to Mokihana of Kauai, then mauka to Kuhio Highway. It will run alongside the highway across Uhelekawawa Canal and connect to the primary pathway. A new bridge will span the canal on the makai side of the highway. Most of the path will be at grade and made of concrete, but other materials and design features will be used when appropriate. The project does not include new structures or parking areas, but includes amenities and landscaping. Impacts are expected to be short-term and temporary, including noise, dust, and occasional traffic delays from roadside construction. Impacts will be mitigated through best management practices, traffic control planning, and regulatory permits. In the long term, the facility will require public funds for maintenance, but will provide a safe route through town for pedestrians and bicyclists. See page 5.

County of Hawaii Parking Lot

The County of Hawai'i, Department of Public Works (DPW) is proposing to develop a parking lot that will serve the employees of the Hawai'i Public Safety Building and will also serve as a storage area for impounded/confiscated vehicles in the district of South Hilo, Island of Hawai'i. The property involved is situated on the east side of Kapi'olani Street, approximately 100 feet south of the Kapi'olani Street-Kukuau Street intersection, at Kukuau 1st, South Hilo, Island of Hawai'i, Tax Map Key 2-4-25: 44, 46 and portion of 28.

The County owns the subject property and is proposing to utilize approximately 34,000 square feet of land to expand and improve an existing parking lot serving the Hawai'i County Public Safety Building. Parcel 44 is currently vacant and consists of 12,277 square feet of land. Parcel 46 consists of 13,133 square feet and is currently unimproved but is being utilized as a parking area. Parcel 28 includes an existing driveway access and paved parking stalls in addition to the existing Public Safety Building.

A preliminary site plan has been developed showing a total net increase of 77 new parking stalls, 36 of which will be utilized for impound parking. Improvements will include a 6' high chain link fence, landscaping and paved parking area. The proposed parking lot will utilize the existing driveway access on the northern end of parcel 28 so no new access on to Kapiolani Street will be constructed. The chain link fence and landscaping will be installed along the perimeter boundaries of the project area to provide security and a visual buffer. See page 4.

Definitions

Your guide to the Environmental Review Process

Draft Environmental Assessment

A project or action that may affect the environment cannot be implemented until an Environmental Assessment (EA) is prepared in accordance with Chapter 343, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS). If the lead State or county agency (the *proposing agency* for agency actions, or the *approving agency* for applicant actions) anticipates that the project will have no significant environmental impact, then affected agencies, individuals, and organizations must be consulted and a Draft EA (DEA) is written and public notice is published in this periodic bulletin (see, section 343-3, HRS) known as the *Environmental Notice*. The public has 30 days to comment on the Draft EA from the date of the first notice.

Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact

After the lead agency reviews the public comments, if it determines that the project will have no significant effect on the environment, and then it will prepare a Final EA (FEA) and issue a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) formerly called a *Negative Declaration*. The Final EA must respond to all public comments. An Environmental Impact Statement will not be required and the project may now be implemented. The public has 30 days from the first notice of a FONSI in this periodic bulletin to ask a court to require the preparation of an EIS.

Final Environmental Assessment and Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice

When a lead agency decides that a project may have a significant environmental impact, an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) must be prepared prior to implementing the project. Like the DEA (see *above*), affected agencies, individuals and organizations must be consulted prior to preparation of the final EA (FEA) and issuance of a determination called an EIS preparation notice (EISPN). (The EA is called *final*, to distinguish it from the draft, above). After the FEA is written by the lead agency, and notice of the FEA and EISPN is published in this periodic bulletin, any agency, group, or individual has 30 days from the first publication of the EISPN to request to become a consulted party and to make written comments regarding the environmental effects of the proposed action. The public (including an applicant) has 60 days from the first notice of an EISPN in this periodic bulletin to ask a court to not require the preparation of an EIS.

Draft Environmental Impact Statement

After receiving the comments on the FEA and EISPN (see *above*), the lead agency or private applicant must prepare a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) prior to project implementation. This document must completely disclose the likely impacts of a project. Direct, indirect and cumulative impacts must be discussed along with measures proposed to mitigate them. The public has 45 days from the first publication date in this periodic bulletin to comment on a DEIS. The DEIS must respond to comments received during the FEA-EISPN comment period in a *point-by-point* manner.

Final Environmental Impact Statement

After considering all public comments filed during the DEIS stage, the agency or applicant must prepare a Final EIS (FEIS). The FEIS must respond in a *point-by-point* manner to all comments from the draft stage. Requisite deeper analyses must be included in the FEIS. For applicant projects, the approving agency is authorized to accept the FEIS. For agency project the Governor or the county mayor is the accepting authority. Only after the EIS is accepted may the project be implemented.

Acceptability

If the FEIS is accepted, the law requires that notice of this be published in this periodic bulletin. The public has 60 days from the date of first notice of acceptance to ask a court to vacate the acceptance of an EIS. In the case of applicant actions, the law requires that an approving agency must make a determination on acceptance within thirty-days of receipt of the FEIS or the FEIS is deemed accepted. Also, for applicant actions, the law provides for an administrative appeal of a non-acceptance to the Environmental Council.

National Environmental Policy Act

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal projects to prepare an EA or EIS. In many ways it is similar to Hawai'i's law. Some projects require both a state (and county) and federal EIS and the public comment procedure should be coordinated. Although not required by law, the OEQC publishes NEPA notices in this periodic bulletin to help keep the public informed of important federal actions.

Conservation District

Any use of land in the State Conservation District requires a Conservation District Use Application (CDUA). These applications are reviewed and approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR). Members of the public may intervene in the permit process. Notice of these permit applications is published in this periodic bulletin.

Special Management Area

The Special Management Area (SMA) is along the coastlines of all our islands and development in this area is generally regulated by Chapter 205A, HRS and county ordinance. A special subset of the SMA that is regulated by Chapter 343, HRS is the Shoreline Setback Area. Most development in this area requires a Special Management Permit (SMP). This periodic bulletin posts notice of these SMP applications to encourage public input.

Shoreline Certifications

State law requires that Hawai'i shorelines be surveyed and certified when necessary to clearly establish the shoreline setback (an area contained between the certified shoreline and a prescribe distance inland (usually 40 feet) from the certified shoreline). The public may participate in the process to help assure accurate regulatory boundaries. Private land owners often petition to have their shoreline certified by the State surveyor prior to construction. This periodic bulletin publishes notice from the Department of Land and Natural Resources of both shoreline certification applicants and of final certifications or rejections.

Environmental Council

The Environmental Council is a fifteen-member citizen board appointed by the Governor to advise the State on environmental concerns. The council makes the rules that govern the Environmental Impact Statement process. The agendas of their regular meetings are published on the Internet at <http://www.ehawaii.gov.org/calendar> and the public is invited to attend.

Exemption Lists

Government agencies must keep a list describing the minor activities they regularly perform that are declared exempt from the environmental review process. These lists are reviewed and approved by the Environmental Council. This periodic bulletin will publish an agency's draft exemption list for public comment prior to Council decision making, as well as notice of the Council's decision on the list.

Endangered Species

This periodic bulletin is required by Section 343-3(c), HRS, to publish notice of public comment periods or public hearings for habitat conservation plans (HCP), safe harbor agreements (SHA), or incidental take licenses (ITL) under the federal Endangered Species Act, as well as availability for public inspection of a proposed HCP or SHA, or a proposed ITL (as a part of an HCP or SHA).

(1) Temporary Interim Rule Closing Federal Waters in Main Hawaiian Islands for Bottomfish

Proposed Action: The National Marine Fisheries Service is issuing a temporary interim rule closing federal waters in the main Hawaiian Islands to commercial and recreational fishing for seven species of deepwater bottomfish during May through September 2007. The bottomfish species involved in the closure are onaga, 'opakapaka, ehu, lehi, gindai, kalekale and hapu'upu'u. The interim rule is intended to immediately reduce fishing effort on the bottomfish stocks that are experiencing overfishing while the Western Pacific Fishery Management Council revises the previously proposed Amendment 14 to the Bottomfish Fishery Management Plan (see *The Environmental Notice*, 2/23/07, p. 15). The previously proposed Amendment 14 targeted a 15-percent reduction in fishing based on 2003 data, which is now recognized to be insufficient to reduce fishing effort by a required 24-percent determined by a September 2006 updated stock assessment based on 2004 data.

(2) Proposed Rule Amending Federal Minimum Size Regulations for Black Coral in Hawai'i

Proposed Action: The National Marine Fisheries Service is proposing to amend the Federal minimum Federal size regulations for harvesting black coral in Hawai'i. Current minimum size requirements specify that black coral colonies must be 48-inches tall or one-inch in the stem diameter measured no closer than one-inch from the top of the living holdfast. Current regulations also contain a provision that exempts certain fishermen from the minimum stem diameter requirement, allowing the harvest of black coral with a stem diameter of 0.75-inch by anyone who reported harvests to the State of Hawai'i within the five years prior to April 17, 2002. The proposed rule amendment would remove the 0.75-inch stem diameter exemption, and the regulations would continue to require that all harvested living black coral have a stem diameter of one-inch. The purpose of the proposed rule amendment is to reduce the impact of fishing on black coral populations in the 'Au'au Channel (south of Maui).



The impacts on the human environment associated with replacing the existing fishery management plans (FMPs) with fishery ecosystem plans (FEPs) for the Western Pacific Region (American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Hawai'i, the U.S. Pacific Remote Island Areas, and the pelagic zone fisheries) are discussed in this analysis. Components of the proposed action include place-based fishery ecosystem plans replacing species-based fishery ecosystem plans and designation of management units to be managed under each fishery ecosystem plan. Important issues evaluated include biological impacts on bottomfish, precious corals, coral reef ecosystems, crustaceans, essential fish habitat, protected species, fishery participants and communities, and administration and enforcement. None of the action considered will result in irreversible or irretrievable commitments. The establishment of Regional Ecosystem Committees (part of the preferred alternative) would enhance the Council's ability to coordinate with member management agencies to address non-fishing-related issues that could impact the physical environment. Migratory Bird Hunting - Proposed Rule

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) proposes to establish annual hunting regulations for certain migratory game birds for the 2007-08 hunting season. FWS annually prescribes outside limits (frameworks) within which States may select hunting seasons. This notice announces FWS's intent to establish open hunting seasons and daily bag and possession limits for certain designated groups or species of migratory game birds for 2007-08 in the contiguous United States, Alaska, Hawai'i, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, under Sec. Sec. 20.101 through 20.107, 20.109, and 20.110 of subpart K of 50 CFR part 20. For the 2007-08 migratory game bird hunting season, we will propose regulations for certain designated members of the avian families *Anatidae* (ducks, geese, and swans); *Columbidae* (doves and pigeons); *Gruidae* (cranes); *Rallidae* (rails, coots, moorhens, and gallinules); and *Scolopacidae* (woodcock and snipe).
