Electronic Documents and the EIS Process

The Office received an inquiry from a consultant on whether Adobe Acrobat Portable Document Format (PDF) files can be used in lieu of hard paper copies of an environmental impact statement.

When the EIS rules were amended in 1996, the notion of a tamper proof, easily distributed "electronic document" was not a common one. Since then, technology has progressed to where such documents can be created and distributed easily by way of electronic mail or the Internet. Today, our society is confronted with a "digital divide." We at the Office of Environmental Quality Control remain uncertain as to how many have access to computers and the Internet, and how many do not.

Until the Environmental Council amends its rules to address the use of electronic documents, the Office respectfully recommends that during the early consultation phases of the environmental assessment that would precede a draft environmental impact statement, the agency should review the distribution list found in the Guidebook and inquire in writing in advance whether those on this list would like to receive a hard paper copy of the environmental impact statement, or an Adobe Acrobat PDF file of the same. We believe that doing so would serve to reduce printing costs and minimize waste paper.

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
Hawai'i Range Complex Final Environmental Impact Statement/Overseas Environmental Impact Statement

Definitions

Your guide to the Environmental Review Process

Draft Environmental Assessment

A project or action that may affect the environment cannot be implemented until an Environmental Assessment (EA) is prepared in accordance with Chapter 343, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS). If the lead State or county agency (the *proposing agency* for agency actions, or the *approving agency* for applicant actions) anticipates that the project will have no significant environmental impact, then affected agencies, individuals, and organizations must be consulted and a Draft EA (DEA) is written and public notice is published in this periodic bulletin (see, section 343-3, HRS) known as the *Environmental Notice*. The public has 30 days to comment on the Draft EA from the date of the first notice.

Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact

After the lead agency reviews the public comments, if it determines that the project will have no significant effect on the environment, and then it will prepare a Final EA (FEA) and issue a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) formerly called a *Negative Declaration*. The Final EA must respond to all public comments. An Environmental Impact Statement will not be required and the project may now be implemented. The public has 30 days from the first notice of a FONSI in this periodic bulletin to ask a court to require the preparation of an EIS.

Final Environmental Assessment and Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice

When a lead agency decides that a project may have a significant environmental impact, an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) must be prepared prior to implementing the project. Like the DEA (see *above*), affected agencies, individuals and organizations must be consulted prior to preparation of the final EA (FEA) and issuance of a determination called an EIS preparation notice (EISPN). (The EA is called *final*, to distinguish it from the draft, *above*). After the FEA is written by the lead agency, and notice of the FEA and EISPN is published in this periodic bulletin, any agency, group, or individual has 30 days from the first publication of the EISPN to request to become a consulted party and to make written comments regarding the environmental effects of the proposed action. The public (including an applicant) has 60 days from the first notice of an EISPN in this periodic bulletin to ask a court to not require the preparation of an EIS.

Draft Environmental Impact Statement

After receiving the comments on the FEA and EISPN (see *above*), the lead agency or private applicant must prepare a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) prior to project implementation. This document must completely disclose the likely impacts of a project. Direct, indirect and cumulative impacts must be discussed along with measures proposed to mitigate them. The public has 45 days from the first publication date in this periodic bulletin to comment on a DEIS. The DEIS must respond to comments received during the FEA-EISPN comment period in a *point-by-point* manner.

Final Environmental Impact Statement

After considering all public comments filed during the DEIS stage, the agency or applicant must prepare a Final EIS (FEIS). The FEIS must respond in a *point-by-point* manner to all comments from the draft stage. Requisite deeper analyses must be included in the FEIS. For applicant projects, the approving agency is authorized to accept the FEIS. For agency project the Governor or the county mayor is the accepting authority. Only after the EIS is accepted may the project be implemented.

Acceptability

If the FEIS is accepted, the law requires that notice of this be published in this periodic bulletin. The public has 60 days from the date of first notice of acceptance to ask a court to vacate the acceptance of an EIS. In the case of applicant actions, the law requires that an approving agency must make a determination on acceptance within thirty-days of receipt of the FEIS or the FEIS is deemed accepted. Also, for applicant actions, the law provides for an administrative appeal of a non-acceptance to the Environmental Council.

National Environmental Policy Act

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal projects to prepare an EA or EIS. In many ways it is similar to Hawai'i's law. Some projects require both a state (and county) *and* federal EIS and the public comment procedure should be coordinated. Although not required by law, the OEQC publishes NEPA notices in this periodic bulletin to help keep the public informed of important federal actions.

Conservation District

Any use of land in the State Conservation District requires a Conservation District Use Application (CDUA). These applications are reviewed and approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR). Members of the public may intervene in the permit process. Notice of these permit applications is published in this periodic bulletin.

Special Management Area

The Special Management Area (SMA) is along the coastlines of all our islands and development in this area is generally regulated by Chapter 205A, HRS and county ordinance. A special subset of the SMA that is regulated by Chapter 343, HRS is the Shoreline Setback Area. Most development in this area requires a Special Management Permit (SMP). This periodic bulletin posts notice of these SMP applications to encourage public input.

Shoreline Certifications

State law requires that Hawai'i shorelines be surveyed and certified when necessary to clearly establish the shoreline setback (an area contained between the certified shoreline and a prescribe distance inland (usually 40 feet) from the certified shoreline). The public may participate in the process to help assure accurate regulatory boundaries. Private land owners often petition to have their shoreline certified by the State surveyor prior to construction. This periodic bulletin publishes notice from the Department of Land and Natural Resources of both shoreline certification applicants and of final certifications or rejections.

Environmental Council

The Environmental Council is a fifteen-member citizen board appointed by the Governor to advise the State on environmental concerns. The council makes the rules that govern the Environmental Impact Statement process. The agendas of their regular meetings are published on the Internet at <http://www.ehawaii.gov.org/calendar> and the public is invited to attend.

Exemption Lists

Government agencies must keep a list describing the minor activities they regularly perform that are declared exempt from the environmental review process. These lists are reviewed and approved by the Environmental Council. This periodic bulletin will publish an agency's draft exemption list for public comment prior to Council decision making, as well as notice of the Council's decision on the list.

Endangered Species

This periodic bulletin is required by Section 343-3(c), HRS, to publish notice of public comment periods or public hearings for habitat conservation plans (HCP), safe harbor agreements (SHA), or incidental take licenses (ITL) under the federal Endangered Species Act, as well as availability for public inspection of a proposed HCP or SHA, or a proposed ITL (as a part of an HCP or SHA).

The Ka'upulehu project site is located in the North Kona District of Hawai'i at about 3,300 feet mean sea level east, or *mauka*, of Mamalahoa Highway (State Route 190) about 9 miles northeast of Kailua-Kona and 8 miles east of the Kona International Airport at Keahole, on the northern slope of the Hualalai Volcano. The project site will occupy an area of about 28,900 SF (0.66 acres) and is about 2.2 miles almost directly up hill from the 29-mile marker on Mamalahoa Highway. The facility will be sited adjacent to and slightly below an existing communication facility owned by the Hawai'i Electric Light Company (HELCO) which includes five towers. A second communication facility with two towers owned by Hawaiian Telcom is located approximately 1,000 feet to the west and about 40 feet lower than the DAGS site. Access to the project site will be via the existing road used to reach the other nearby facilities.

The unmanned telecommunications facility would be built on approximately 0.66 acres to allow installation of a grounding system. A short driveway will connect the site to the existing access road. DAGS is proposing to construct: 1) a 150-foot high self-supported 4-leg tower with 14 microwave dish antennas and other whip, panel, and yagi style antennas; 2) an approximately 900-square foot by 12-foot high building, and 3) other supporting facilities, including a diesel fuel tank, and interior items to support radio equipment such as a emergency generator, batteries and charger system, and air conditioning. The entire facility will be designed and constructed to remain operational at wind speeds of up to 110 miles per hour (mph) and to survive wind speeds of up to 155 mph. Electrical power will be supplied via connection to the commercial power line that services the existing nearby facilities. No State or County of Hawai'i employees will be assigned to the facility on a daily basis.

'O'oma Beachside Village will be a diverse, mixed use coastal community located in North Kona, Hawai'i, makai of Queen Ka'ahumanu Highway, an area often reserved for resort development.


'O'oma Beachside Village will provide 950 to 1,200 homes focused on the primary resident market including multi-family, "live-work" units, workforce, gap group, and affordable homes, and single-family home lots. Two mixed-use villages will include neighborhood business and services within walking distance of homes. The community will also include supporting infrastructure such as a wastewater treatment plant, a water system, and a charter school site.

Approximately one-third of the community will be open space parks, preserves, and landscaped areas. With a setback of at least 1,100-feet from the shoreline, the open space includes a 57-acre coastal preserve and an 18-acre public shoreline park.

Positive impacts include the provision of primary housing with ocean access, substantial open space, protection of archaeological and cultural resources, and increased economic activity.

Potential adverse environmental impacts include, increases in traffic, greater demands on public infrastructure systems, and short-term impacts to air quality and noise levels due to construction.

The DEIS contains an analysis of potential impacts and associated mitigation measures to ensure potential adverse impacts are minimized or mitigated.

The Bishop Museum is developing a visitor education center and parking lot at the Amy Greenwell Ethnobotanical Garden with assistance from a \$1.0 million State appropriation. The center will be built on a 1.718-acre property adjacent to the 13-acre Garden that was recently acquired by the Museum.

Phase 1 includes building a one-story 1,600 sf building with exhibit space, offices, and restrooms; landscape improvements; and a 15-space parking lot. The Garden, open to the public on weekdays, supports Hawaiian cultural traditions of plant use through on-site and outreach educational programs, school visits and activities, workshops, plant sales, and conservation.

The project would have a negligible effect on traffic in the area, as it would basically relocate an access and produce relatively few peak-hour trips. Short-term noise, air, and water quality impacts associated with grading and landscaping would be mitigated. A drywell and associated drainage structures will be designed and built to retain the increase in runoff from the Phase I improvements relative to pre-development conditions from a 50-year storm event. If and when Phase II improvements are built, the drainage will be reanalyzed, and a drywell system capable of handling additional runoff from a minimum 25-year storm event will be constructed.

Archaeological and cultural surveys of the previously graded site have concluded that no significant sites would be adversely affected. Work involving potential land disturbance will be strictly limited to the project site through contractor orientation and orange fencing to mark sensitive areas. If archaeological resources, Hawaiian cultural items or human remains are encountered during land-altering activities associated with construction, work in the immediate area of the discovery will be halted and the State Historic Preservation Division will be contacted.; The Garden functions as an essential cultural resource by providing education in Hawaiian cultural traditions; the project will enhance the Garden's ability to provide these educational resources.

The Hawai'i County Department of Water Supply (DWS) plans to remove the existing 0.20 million gallon capacity (Mg) Ola'a Reservoir No. 2 in Kea'au and construct a 0.50 Mg reservoir nearby. The existing reservoir, pumps and supporting facilities have reached the end of their service life, are undersized for current needs, have required expensive maintenance, and do not meet current DWS standards. The new reinforced concrete reservoir will be larger and better able to meet future demands in its water service area. Other features include a pump station with two booster pumps, a control building, a driveway, perimeter fencing, and landscaping. The existing transite water main along Milo Street will be replaced with a ductile iron pipe. Once existing water services are reconnected to the new tank, the existing reservoir will be demolished and the site landscaped to match the surrounding area. The improvements will promote public health and safety by improving water storage capacity for the Kea'au area.

The contractor will implement a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) to contain sediment and storm water runoff during construction. Mitigation for worker and adjacent resident exposure to arsenic, asbestos and lead will be undertaken as part of construction. Hazardous substances will be abated by appropriate measures during construction and demolition. Implementation of the project would have a minor effect on local traffic, possibly requiring only a short-term single-lane closure during grading and paving of vehicular access points and during installation of the water line. The new reservoir site is a former sugar cane field and an active papaya field. No significant biological, archaeological or cultural resources are present. If archaeological resources or human remains are encountered during land-altering activities, work will be halted and the State Historic Preservation Division will be contacted.

This Environmental Assessment addresses proposed parking lot improvements at Wai'anae Beach Park. The proposed improvements would add 31 standard stalls and two ADA stalls to the existing 24 standard stalls and one ADA stall. The improvements are within a 0.5 acre area surrounding the existing parking lot. New parking lot lighting which is compatible with marine life and sea birds will be installed. One monkeypod tree will be relocated and four monkeypod trees will be added for a net increase of four monkeypod trees. Native white hibiscus will be planted as a border on one side of the parking lot. Drainage will be via an existing drywell. There are no known historic or prehistoric sites affected and subsurface sampling was performed at the proposed for verification.

The Draft EIS reports that the proposed expansion to Waimanalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill (WGSL) is anticipated to generate potential adverse impacts as follows: modification to the existing landforms, dust, mud tracking onto highway, noise and odors and other air emissions, cultural resources, views, windblown litter, possible release of leachates into the brackish groundwater, perception of environmental injustice, and traffic hazards. The DEIS contains measures to mitigate the potential for adverse impacts. Regarding project benefits, the project will provide a municipal solid waste disposal site for the next approximately 15 years within the same valley thereby precluding the Applicant from developing another site for landfill purposes and thus avoiding impacts to other O'ahu communities if a new site were developed. The Applicant proposes community benefits to offset any potential adverse impacts that cannot be adequately mitigated. Indirect and/or secondary impacts include the creation of direct/indirect and induced jobs and increased state revenues as the result of project construction.

Sause Bros., Inc. proposes to construct a storage yard facility adjacent to the Kalaeloa Barbers Point Harbor area in Kalaeloa. The storage yard facility will be used to store lumber, related building supplies and materials, and other products serving the construction industry.

Facility improvements proposed include site grading of approximately 6.85 acres. The project site will be graded and overlain with basalt gravel. An office building with floor space of 976 square feet will also be constructed. An individual wastewater treatment system will be installed to support wastewater treatment requirements.

The proposed project site currently serves as an unimproved storage yard within an industrial area adjacent to the Kalaeloa

Barbers Point Harbor. Surrounding land is zoned for waterfront industrial and is mostly undeveloped. Adjacent land uses include the Campbell Industrial Park, coral mining and stockpiling operations, the Ko 'Olina Resort, and agricultural lands. The nearby agricultural lands are not in active use.

The proposed project is not expected to have significant negative impacts on flora, fauna, historical, cultural, and scenic and visual resources.

Anticipated temporary impacts include minor traffic and increased noise levels during construction. No significant short or long-term effects are anticipated.

The proposed project is consistent with all land use policies and regulations for the area and supports the stated objectives of the O'ahu Commercial Harbors 2020 Master Plan and the General Plan to develop and improve the facilities at Kalaeloa Barbers Point Harbor to meet the future operational requirements of O'ahu's commercial harbors.
